THANKSGIVING SERVICE

On Wed. Nov. 21 at 7:30pm, we will host our 2nd Annual Spring-Ford Ecumenical Thanksgiving Eve Service. Beginning in 2011, this service was expanded from St. James UCC and our sister church, St. James Lutheran, to include all of the Spring-Ford Ministerium churches. More than 20 congregations are invited to bring food donations, and an offering for Project Outreach will be collected. Our goal is to meet this year's projected shortfall for funding the heating program for low-income families.

Our ecumenical service will include a meditation on Faith and Thanksgiving; stories of thanksgiving from our congregations; traditional and contemporary music, and a combined choir. We'll gather after the service for food and fellowship. Dessert donations are welcome! Anyone is welcome to participate in the choir by attending at least one of our regular Thurs. rehearsals by Nov. 15, and the 6:30pm rehearsal on Nov. 21.

FAMILY & HOLIDAY TUNES

Our Family Choir is off to a great start with 20 singers on Oct. 21! This is a new way of sharing music traditions with our children while also including adults who like to sing but can't always make the regular commitment to our choir.

The November Family Choir will be for our Nov. 18 Harvest Home celebration, so that our entire church family can be part of dedicating the day's special offerings. We'll meet that morning at 9am to learn a simple tune that everyone will sing together as the anthem.

As Advent draws near, we are forming two Christmas choirs, for singing and for playing bells. (What's Christmas without some bells ringing?)

The Christmas choir will sing one Sunday in December and the bells will play on a different Sunday. Both choirs will also both participate in the 9:00pm Christmas Eve service. Rehearsals will be on Thursday evenings and possibly on Sundays after services. Dates will be determined once we hear back about your interest and availability.

ALL SAINT'S DAY OSBSERVANCE

On Sunday, Nov. 4, we will observe the annual celebration of All Saints' Day. This is an opportunity for us to give thanks for the "saints" of our congregation and in our lives: those who have long since passed away and those who live on as witnesses to the Gospel of mercy and the love of God. We will take a few moments as a part of our prayers and communion celebration to especially remember those in our congregation who have died during the past year and who rest now from the labors of life in God's eternal embrace. THE FAROLITOS OF CHRISTMAS

This year's Christmas pageant will have a "Southwest" twist, based on the children's book *The* Farolitos *of Christmas* by Rudolfo Anaya. Set during World War II, the book tells the story of a young girl who waits for her father to return after being injured as a U.S. soldier. Unable to cut wood for the usual Christmas bonfires, the children create small paper lanterns (*farolitos*) instead, which light the way for Christmas pilgrims as they remember the journeys of Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the Magi. The lanterns also light the way for one unexpected pilgrim's return to his hometown!

During our December 23 worship service, the children and adults of St. James will share the story of this pilgrimage with songs, acting, lanterns, and Bible verses. Children will hear the story on Nov. 25 and rehearsals will be held Dec. 2, 9, & 10 during Children's Church as well as after worship as needed. Speaking and nonspeaking parts are available for children, youth, and adults; we also need lots of extra prop and set designers for children who are a bit shy about acting or singing. Music soloists are also welcome; please let Pastor Rachael know if you're interested.

MISSION UPDATE

At the end of September, we observed the Neighbors in Need Mission Offering. Thanks to your generosity, our Neighbors in Need offering totaled more than \$700!

Neighbors in Need supports a commitment to justice and compassion through the United States and Puerto Rico. Two-thirds of Neighbors in Need supports the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries and one-third supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM).

These programs include justice advocacy and direct service projects such as just-peace programs and community grants. CAIM is the voice of American Indian members of the UCC and provides them support ranging from advocating for justice to supporting the work of churches and their pastors.

SPECIAL MORINGA COMMUNITY GUEST NOV. 4!

We joyfully look forward to welcoming special guest Abubakar Abdulai of the Moringa Community, along with local partners Jeffry & Linda Lohr, during and after our service of worship on Sunday, Nov. 4. Abu is the Ghanaian co-founder of Moringa, who brought his story and a deep willingness to learn when he arrived here to study woodworking with Jeffry. Years later, Abu continues to develop and lead the various projects of the Moringa Community School of Trades in Breman Baako, Ghana. Moringa is an inspiring example of local Africans seeking self-sustainability through education, building on initial investments and donations from Western partners, and creating a place of opportunity and hope in one of the most destitute regions of the world. The school offers training in Food Preservation & Nutrition; Agriculture and Farming; Machine-Based Woodworking; Weaving, Soap Making, and other traditional craft-related trades. Their mission is to fight poverty through empowering underprivileged people to create practical, locally appropriate small businesses that can sustain them and their families.

After a very long wait, Abu has finally obtained the necessary visa to travel to the U.S. once more, this time to share his story and thanksgivings with many faithful sponsors and supporters of the Moringa Community. St. James UCC has been honored to be a small but foundational part of supporting Moringa's success; and we hope to continue with Mission Partnership support pending the acceptance of the 2013 budget at our next Congregational Meeting. We encourage you to come to church on Nov. 4, meet Abu, and hear about the latest new developments at Moringa!

CHILDREN'S CHURCH CONTINUES WITH BIBLE STORIES & PAGEANT

Our elementary-age children have been enjoying a new Bible storytelling program called Godly Play. This creative approach to exploring the Bible also allows time for seasonal crafts and games, and makes it easier for children to return to the sanctuary for the last part of worship. Hallelujah! The Bible & Handel's Messiah

Our Sunday Morning Bible Study continues every week at 9:00am through November with the Acts of the Apostles, in part three of a study by the Rev. Martin Copenhaver, a UCC pastor and writer. Then, for Advent, we'll begin a 4-week study (Dec. 2, 9, 16, & 23) on the Scripture and music of Handel's Messiah. The study will also continue in 2013 with a six-session Lenten series leading up to Easter, and the big "Hallelujah!" moment of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. For these Messiah studies, we will meet in the High School room directly across from the office (for acoustic reasons).

One local opportunity to hear the Messiah is coming up at Ursinus College. This December will mark the 75th anniversary of Handel's Messiah performances at Ursinus College. The piece will be sung by the College Choir and Meistersingers on Dec. 1 at 7:30 p.m.; & at a matinee, Dec. 2 at 2 p.m., in Bomberger Auditorium. Tickets are \$10; let Pastor Rachael know if you'd like to order Sunday tickets through church so we can attend as a group.

From the Pastor's Desk...

Forgiveness: Giving Power to the Future

Perhaps you feel like you've been hearing the word "forgiveness" a lot lately at St. James. The Revitalization Team includes "practice forgiveness" as one of the points in our congregational covenant, which will be shared as a first draft at our Nov. 11 Congregational Meeting. This working document includes feedback from nearly 50 of our congregation's leaders, so it's clear that many of you feel like forgiveness is a significant part of the life of faith. We also talk about forgiveness every time we pass the Peace of Christ during worship. Peter Steinke talks about forgiveness as something that "gives power to the future." This doesn't mean just any future, but one that is full of hope and healing. In forgiving another, Steinke suggests we must work through these ten steps in a gradual process:

We say...

- I have been wronged by you
- I have the right and reason to end any connection between us
- I have the right and reason to demand from you a payment or an apology
- My sense of dignity and my values require nothing less
- Nonetheless I refuse to let the wrong consume me in resentment;
- And I refuse to let the wrong come between us.
- I give no assurance that I'll be able to forget the wrong that you've done;
- I demand no condition. Whether or not you accept my forgiveness or ask for it has nothing to do with my offer;
- I want to be at peace with myself and be glad in your presence.
- I want to open the door to tomorrow.

As we are nearly all engaged at all times in some process of forgiveness, I offer these steps as one way to consider the great challenge and reward of our faith.
